Institution: Lake Michigan College

Section 230 of PA 103 of 2023, the Fiscal Year 2024 community colleges appropriations bill contains the qualifications that must be met to receive the portion of each college's performance funding appropriation earmarked for local strategic value. The statute lists 15 separate best practices for community colleges to achieve. Institutions must satisfy 4 of 5 best practices in each of 3 different categories.

To demonstrate eligibility for this funding, Section 230 requires that each community college certifies compliance to the State Budget Office by means of a board of trustees resolution certifying that the college has met 4 of 5 best practices in each category. Further, each board resolution "shall provide specifics as to how the community college meets each best practice measure within each category." **This resolution must be properly passed by the board and submitted to this office on or before October 15, 2023**. However, if a resolution from a prior year is still in effect and factually correct, you may resubmit this resolution. Please send a copy with an indication of the date of its passage.

Each category is worth one-third of the total amount available for your institution. (i) The community college has active partnerships with local employers including hospitals and health care providers.	The College's active partnerships with hospitals and health care organizations are inclusive of health care program apprenticeships and strategies to increase the diversity within the health care field. All Career & Workforce Education (CWE) and Health Sciences programs at the College have an advisory committee that includes representation from business and industry. Every CWE and Health Sciences program is required to have two advisory committee meetings per year. Through advisory committees for CWE courses, the College interacts and solicits advice from regional employers on course offerings and program development. Many students in our health care programs are hired either during their education or after graduation because of their clinical experience or internship. Once a year LMC offers a Kettering Seminar that further educates up to five of our Radiologic Technology alum (that have graduated and registered) from our clinical facilities.

	Human Resources representatives from area medical centers, including Corewell Health, Bronson, and surrounding healthcare facilities, participate in short-term training programs offered by the College to speak with students about multiple career opportunities.
	Corewell Health Lakeland offers flu vaccines for health science students on campus or while attending their clinical education during the fall semester as a service for all students.
	Berrien County Health Department provided free TB skin tests for health science students.
	Lake Michigan College and Kinexus meet monthly for the purpose of partnership development and information sharing. Topics of discussion include updates regarding shared business outreach, student training and employment opportunities, educational programming, resource opportunities (grants, federal programs), and shared referrals.
	The College's CWE Division collaborates with area employers to build coop, internship, job shadowing, and other work-based learning opportunities for students while serving the workforce needs of employers.
	The College has apprenticeship agreements with more than 40 companies and works closely with local manufacturers to ensure programs meet industry standards. Currently, the Hanson Technology Center registers more than 135 apprenticeship participants.
	The College works with and has onsite training for Whirlpool Corporation, various law enforcement agencies, Corewell Health, AEP (Indiana Michigan Power), DC Cook Nuclear Power Plant, Eagle Technologies, Hanson International, and others.
	The College has an established on-site partnership on its Benton Harbor and South Haven campuses with a local childcare provider, Kidzone, who provides clinical rotations for students.
	The Lake Michigan College Criminal Justice program has active internship partnerships with the Berrien County Sheriff's Office, Van Buren County Sheriff's Office, City of St. Joseph Department of Public Safety, City of Benton Harbor Department of Public Safety, Lincoln Township Police Department, Chikaming Township Police Department, Berrien County

	The College has received state approval for a new Police Academy, with its
	first scheduled cohort in the Summer of 2024.

	The Welch Center for Wine and Viticulture opened on August 27, 2019, on
	LMC's Benton Harbor Campus. This \$7 million, 14,000-square-foot teaching winery is designed to provide students with a state-of-the-art environment
	to gain hands-on education in art, science, and the business of
	winemaking. The program has an annual enrollment of more than 20
	students. Twenty area vineyards and wineries collaborated on building the program, aimed at educating and training the next generation of wine

The Fab Lab at Lake Michigan College is open to entrepreneurs and other makers for prototyping activities. The Fab Lab is an open access digital studio that provides access to information, tools, software, and space for anyone who has an interest in learning and creating. The Fab Lab provides design software, laser cutters, 3D printers, vinyl cutters, woodshop, CNC (computer numerically controlled) router, CNC (computer numerically controlled) sewing machines and hand tools.
	Small business assistance in MLK Underrepresented Business Directory and MLK Expo, sponsorship through the Mendel Center, 100 Women Strong, Leadership Accelerator Program, 40 Under 40, and more.
	The South Haven campus works with the Chamber of Commerce to host regional economic development summits. Well-known speakers and statewide business groups come together for the day to discuss the economy and to hear perspectives on the business climate and development.

Extended Education works in partnership with academic divisions to create customized business solutions for clients. Extended Education also acts as a connector between regional businesses and organizations and the College. Tech advancement in current and emergent programs like Manufacturing Trades, Robotics, eSports, Virtual Reality (VR) Labs, Marine Maintenance, Agricultural testing, and more. The College has a myriad of advanced technology and works with local companies to provide curriculum to educate local industry building from LMC's multiple health care programs, maintenance and electrical technology, marine maintenance technology, etc.

(i) The community college has active partnerships with regional high schools, intermediate school districts, and career-tech centers to provide instruction through dual enrollment, concurrent enrollment, direct credit, middle college, or academy programs.	LMC has an active Early College/Middle College program with dual credit, dual enrollment, and academy classes for over 1,000 high school students per year. In addition, the College operates an Early College Academy with the Niles, Brandywine, Buchanan, Covert and South Haven school districts, and a Middle College with the Berrien RESA (Regional Education Services Agency), Van Buren Intermediate School District, and the Allegan Area Educational Service Agency. The College supports the Professional Health Careers Academy (PHCA) operated by local school districts and Corewell Health, which provides students with exposure to several professional health care fields. PHCA students take college level classes for academic credit. Staff serve on selection panels and provide support services throughout the school year. LMC partners with Van Buren Tech Center through our Cisco Networking Academy, so students have a path to earn a 2-year degree, then transfer to our 4-year partner, Davenport University for a career path in either Network Security or Cyber Defense. Berrien Regional Educational Services Administration (RESA) holds Career Pathways (Exploration) Day each year at the College for all Berrien County 9th grade students. College staff serve on the Berrien County School Superintendents' Advisory Committee, and attend Counselor, Principal, and Career Technical Education Director meetings. The College is a key partner with Berrien RESA in the Berrien Talent Collaborative, a new initiative to drive pre-apprentice and apprenticeship training in Southwest Michigan. Other key partners are the Greater Niles Chamber of Commerce and the Southwest Michigan Regional Chamber of Commerce.

(iv) The community college provides, supports, or participates in programming to promote successful transitions to college for new or reentering adult students, such as adult basic education, GED preparation and testing, or recruiting, advising, or orientation activities specific to adults.	Educational Opportunities Center, Student Support Services, Reconnect Grant, Testing Services (including Accuplacer, external and internal testing), tutoring services, NetTutor, dedicated orientation, Veteran Services, and more. The College hosts a federal TRiO Educational Opportunity Center program designed to create Individualized Educational Development Plans for returning students; offers Pre-GED or college admissions/placement test tutoring; provides career information, assessment, and advising; and assistance with the admissions process for post-secondary enrollment. The TRiO EOC program also targets displaced homemakers for academic support services.
	The College has an office with staff dedicated to serving returning veterans, including appropriating funds from the College's Foundation for emergent needs of veterans. In addition, the College has created a dedicated Veterans Center on the Benton Harbor campus where a lounge area with computers and other career-oriented information exists to assist veterans. (v) The community college has active partnerships with regional 4-year colleges and universities to promote successful transfer, such as articulation, 2+2, or reverse transfer agreements or operation of a university center.	The College has active partnerships with several regional 4-year colleges and universities, in various capacities including reverse transfer agreements, articulation agreements, consortium agreements, and oncampus extensions, which allow for collaborative, smooth pathways for students to transfer from LMC to a baccalaureate program. Current agreements include Arizona State University, Davenport University (for both Cyber Security and Cisco Network Academy students), Ferris State University, Grand Valley State University, Indian Institute of Technology, Siena Heights University, Western Michigan University, and University of Michigan – Flint.
	LMC currently has multiple reverse transfer agreements such as those with Western Michigan University, University of Michigan, Oakland University, and Michigan State University.
	In addition to the above, the College is a participating member of the Michigan Transfer Agreement, which is a statewide transfer agreement.
	Wine and Viticulture has an articulation agreement with Ferris State

	The Associate in Business Administration (ABA) Advisory Committee is made up of the major 4-year Universities that business students choose for transfer. During the 2022-2023 year, LMC was able to initiate and sign an articulation agreement with Indiana Tech for the ABA program.

The students complete an application and participate in an interview with a community panel including representatives from Whirlpool Corporation, the Sr. PGA, the Berrien Community Foundation, the Benton Harbor Promise, and Start to Finish. The panel votes on the winner/recipient of the scholarship. The student works with the Benton Harbor Promise and the Berrien Community Foundation for disbursement of the funds. They are intentional in making sure that the student has enough funds to assist with each remaining semester at their 4-year school.

Fab Lab at Lake Michigan College is available to hobbyists and crafters to promote advanced manufacturing concepts and ideas.
